## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANI:

In his first letter to the church at Corinth, Paul writes,

"Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God and that you are not your own? For you were bought with a price; therefore, glorify God in your body." (6:19-20)

While growing up in the church, I heard these Bible verses quoted numerous times to discourage people from getting tattoos. But not once had I learned in church that treating our bodies as temples of God includes caring about the food we eat, exercising, meditating, spending time outdoors, sleeping, drinking enough water, and so much more. When we focus so much on one interpretation of a scripture text, we lose sight of all the other possible readings and we end up neglecting the beauty of multiple interpretations from the Word of God.

Nonetheless, since the beginning of the new year, I've been thinking more about these alternative interpretations of what it means to glorify God by caring for my body, this temple, that God has gifted me. Whether we are aware of it or not, this pandemic has had an impact on our bodies. Many of us have spent more time at home where we may not move our bodies as often as we used to. For students who transitioned to online learning for the better part of 2020, they spent less time walking from class to class. Employees who worked from home walked across the hall to their home office rather than from the parking lot to their office building. And people who may have had a weekly walk scheduled with a friend chose to pause their walk for safety.

Inactivity has increased tremendously due to the pandemic and our bodies are reacting to this inactivity. Whether it be weight gain, increase in fatigue or stress, or something else entirely, there is a greater need now than ever to attentively schedule exercise in our regular routines.

Scheduling exercise and activity is still a very new practice. Before the rise in technological advances throughout the 20th and 21st centuries, individuals and families received much of their necessary exercise and activity from their work on the farm, household chores, horse riding, hunting, and gathering food, and more. But in today's age, when many sit at a desk for work, physical fitness and exercise has to be scheduled in order to care for our bodies, minds, spirits, and souls.

I believe it is good news that we have bodies. If it weren't, Paul wouldn't call our attention to our bodies and call them *temples* of the Holy Spirit. God gifts us these bodies and now it is our duty to care for them, just as we are called to be caretakers of the earth. Let us be thoughtful caretakers of our very bodies, these temples as well; for we are *fearfully and wonderfully made* by a gracious God (Psalm 139:14).



Easter is not just one day, it's an entire season! During the season of Easter (April -May), we will explore the good news that Christ is risen both from the grave and in every aspect of our lives. We'll spend time living in awe of the mundane moments of our ordinary lives, because the presence of our Risen Lord makes all moments sacred and holy. Explore & journey with us every Sunday morning at 10:30am as we consider how we live in a post resurrection world as Easter people who live as extensions of Christ's hands and feet between Easter Sunday and Pentecost.

We now offer worship inside our sanctuary with guidelines to help keep us safe. Please read below before attending worship in our sanctuary.

In order to safely re-enter the building for worship, we have multiple regulations that we must all take seriously in an effort to keep us safe and healthy. See below for a list of regulations and restrictions as we begin indoor worship soon. We hope you'll join us with a mask & a willingness to experiment together.

#### **INDOOR WORSHIP & SANCTUARY SEATING GUIDELINES:**

- Do not attend any in-person meeting or gathering if you do not feel well or have any symptoms of COVID-19. Masks are required.
- Capacity for the sanctuary is set currently at 36 participants for safety reasons. This number is difficult to define and is somewhat flexible as families are welcome to sit together, but folks who are not related to each other must sit 6-feet apart.
- Like the rest of the building, masks are required in the sanctuary until further notice. Hand sanitizer will be made available for you before and after the service.
- Ushers will greet you at the door before you enter the church building. Ushers will hand you a bulletin and assist you in finding the best place to sit that is distanced from those you are not related to.
- If we reach capacity in the sanctuary, we will then seat folks distanced in the narthex. If the narthex reaches capacity, then we will use seating in the fellowship hall where folks can watch the service on the TV and hear it through the radio that we will provide. Folks are welcome to continue worshipping in their cars (tune your radio to 88.5 to worship along with us), or online.
- Every other pew is marked as not occupiable, beginning with the first row of each aisle. Please abide by these restrictions when you enter the sanctuary by sitting only in rows that are not marked off by tape or ribbon.
- Non-family members in the same pew need to sit physically distanced from the other. The CDC recommends 6 ft. Two or three individuals could sit distanced in the same pew. Again, an usher will assist you.
- Ushers will also dismiss families and individuals at the end of the service. Please do not get up to leave without an usher dismissing you. This helps us keep everyone moving safely and reminds us all that we cannot gather indoors for fellowship after service. Please feel free to chat with one another at a safe distance outdoors after the service.
- Online worship will continue to be made available every week. Our website, ivycentennial.org has all worship links in the "Sermon Videos" tab.
- We will also continue to worship through the radio. So, if you'd like to join us, while staying in the safety of your car, you can join us on Sunday mornings by parking in our parking lot by 10:30am and tuning your radio to 88.5 FM.

## Administrative Council Highlights April 18<sup>th</sup> Meeting

- Gaylen Heaberlin has served as Financial Secretary for more than 30 years and now Joy Warner is transitioning into this role.
- Finance committee is reviewing the process for invoices being submitted and approved for payment by the Treasurer.
- Wind damage to a parking lot light pole will result in two new poles and new lights throughout the parking area which will cost approximately \$10,000.
- Centennial has been approved for a U.S. Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan and received during April \$20,771 which will not need to be repaid. Centennial received a similar loan last summer.
- After receiving nearly \$30,000 over the past three years to assist Centennial's support of a full-time pastor from the Iowa Conference of the United Methodist Church, we have now been informed that our request of \$6,000 for 2021-2022 has been denied due to limited funds.
