I remember how renewed I am as we return to worship in person, both on Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings.

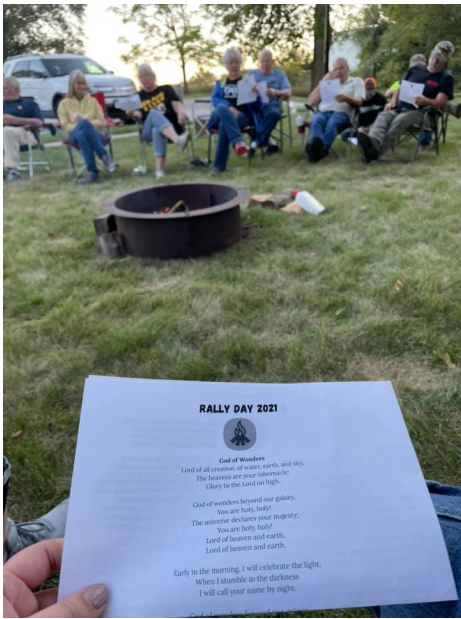

On Trustees

I have been asked by Pastor Dani to tell a little bit about what the trustees have been doing. So, I'm going to start with a project we completed last September. With the help of Don Hiatt, Evan Fischer, and Ken Pickering, we power washed the exterior of the church where the paint was peeling. Then we applied a primer coat of paint and when that was dry, we put on the finish coat. We were all pleased with the results the color match was near perfect.

In early spring age caught up with our parking lot lights and power poles. The light pole in the southwest part of the parking lot had rotted so badly that it fell. Upon inspection it was determined that the main pole also needed to be replaced. By the time the project was completed we had replaced two power poles, three parking lot lights and two lights to illuminate the steeple. All new lights are LED and require only about 1/3 the electrical power as the old.

The latest project was to level and paint the propane tank. Our propane supplier leveled the tank and then we were able to power wash and paint.

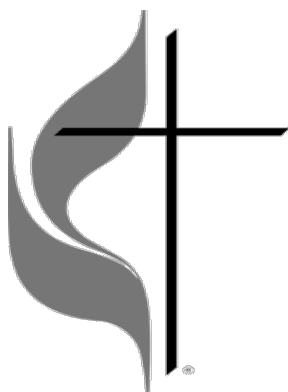
In reflection of our inward communities, we sought to support our church body with cards and small care packages as we all weathered this continuing pandemic situation.

One aspect of our church being a United Methodist Church is apportionments. Apportionments are the fundamental method the church uses to fund mission and ministry beyond the local community.

Apportionments from our church support the work of the district, the annual conference, the jurisdiction, and the General Church. Our 2022 Apportionments total \$11,812.

The total is divided between \$3,072 for General Church apportionments, \$6,975 for Conference Ministries, and \$1,765 for Conference Mission Giving. Our church paying our apportionments helps The United Methodist Church outside the walls of our little white church on the hill.

The Bible often reminds us to share the good news with one another. "Him we proclaim, warning everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone mature in Christ" (Colossians 1:28). That passage reminds us that we should use our capabilities to share the news of Christ and the church with our congregation and neighbors.

The Communications Committee works to make sure that congregation members and those interested in learning about Centennial can do so, by means of the bulletin, church newsletter, website, social media and more. Printing is our committee's biggest expenditure, but it is one of the most important ways that we reach people. We are aware of rising postage and printing costs and work to make our communications available online, as well as continuing to reach our neighbors who still want to read physical copies of our news.



We must work to reach our congregation and neighbors in ways that work for them - by means of printed mailings, newsletters, and electronic mediums, such as telephone calls, email, and the church website. Our budget items include website and calling service, telephone and internet service, newsletter postage, Advent and Lenten printing and mailing, welcome postcard, PO Box fee and annual bulk mailing fee. Within these budget items, we work to include advertisements for the church in area print publications as well as advertising our church Facebook page. We are always keeping in mind who we want to reach and how we can do so, whether we are publicizing church events in print publications or sharing them on social media!

Our goal for 2022 is to make sure that we reach all of our congregation and neighbors and to continue to share the Good News of Christ and of Centennial.
