A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR DANI:

I'm guessing that most of you have either heard or said the serenity prayer before. In case you haven't or don't remember, here's how it goes:

*God, grant me the serenity
to accept the things I cannot change,
courage to change the things I can,
and the wisdom to know the difference.*

Reinhold Niebuhr, an American theologian, ethicist, and professor at Union Theological Seminary famously wrote this prayer 1943. Niebuhr wrote this prayer in a contentious time, as he lived in the midst of both World Wars and the Great Depression. Anxiety and fear overwhelmed the reality of the American culture at the time and Niebuhr gifted the world with this prayer, which was later selected by the *World Almanac* as one of the ten most memorable quotes from the 20th century. Alcoholics Anonymous meetings almost always include a moment where attendees recite this prayer and even Bill Clinton invoked this prayer often throughout his campaign for presidency.

While most of us know the version above, Niebuhr's daughter, Elisabeth Sifton, recorded the longer version. It reads:

*God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change;
courage to change the things I can; and the wisdom to know the difference.
Living one day at a time; enjoying one moment at a time, accepting hardship as the pathway to peace;
Taking, as He did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it; trusting that He will make all things right
if I surrender to His Will; So that I may be reasonably happy in this life and supremely happy with Him
forever and ever in the next. Amen.*

Both versions of this prayer made not only a great impact in the 20th century, but they still do today. We're still living in anxious, uncertain, and fearful times. Our world has not rid itself of war, violence, or economic collapse in the last 80 years and now we're in the middle of a pandemic and increased political division. As we participate in or witness arguments concerning when to wear a mask or which political party will ruin our country more, we continue to surround ourselves with disagreement, division, and anxiety.

However, if we're willing to live as Christ did-- if we're willing to listen with empathy, stand with peace, and find power in the vulnerable, then we may learn to live with less anxiety and instead with more faith in prayer, faith in God, and faith in each other. Throughout the month of September, we'll reflect on the serenity prayer and it's connection to the Bible, as we commit to living lives led by Christ; lives of serenity, acceptance, courage, and wisdom. I hope you'll join us on Sunday mornings at 10:30am in our parking lot or online as we dive and live into this prayer of hope for the future we share together.

As of August 16th, our congregation has donated \$2,450.00 for the Caring Hands Food Pantry since the beginning of 2020. On May 5th, we received **\$20,232** from the Small Business Administration as part of the Covid-19 Stimulus Package. These funds were for the “Paycheck Protection Program” which helps us keep paying our Pastor, Organist, Custodian and Secretary. In order to meet our 2020 budget, we need to average about \$12,480 per month.
