From the Belfry ...

I hate articles that start off asking for money. So, I'm not going to do that. Instead, I'll give you some little-known information about handbells.

Our church handbells were donated as a memorial in the 80's. That's 1980. Since that time, they have never been professionally serviced.

Many bell owners believed when they originally bought their bells that they were "maintenance free instruments". Grand pianos need regular tuning, pipe organs need adjustments, a Rolls Royce needs an oil change every now and then (anyway, that's what I'm told). While handbells need far less attention than most musical instruments, they do need occasional routine servicing.

Handbells are cast of raw bell bronze. They have no protective plating or lacquer finish on them like most other musical instruments. Even though our ringers are careful about not touching the bell with bare hands, eating or chewing gum while ringing, and wiping the bells after practice, SPIT happens. Bells are subject to natural oxidation and visible corrosion that shows up first as an amber haze and then tiny green spots. Without cleaning, the green spots pit the metal. Excessive pitting will change the tune of the bell.

Our bells need a professional machine cleaning. Machine cleaning requires special custommade equipment and is very time-consuming. They also need a few replacement washers and probably some parts I don't even know about. During their "servicing" they will also be "voiced" (has to do with sound quality from one bell to the next). After the servicing they will look

brilliant, sound more consistent, and be easier to ring (just ask any ringer about their cranky bell).

Then after the refurbish, we should plan on basic service every 3 to 4 years or 200 hours of use. Basic service includes replacing parts, playing action adjustments, and voicing. It is recommended the more intensive machine cleaning be done every 10 years.

I enjoy listening to the bells. I'd like to see the bells as part of the worship service for many years to come. I hope you do, too.
