PASTOR'S PULPIT:

Staying Con-tent in Con-tentious Circumstances

The one thing that we as people of faith count on in all of our lives is the simple but comforting fact that we are loved by God. How do we know that? The answer: our salvation, our being touched by the Master's hand, our being born again from above, our having our hearts slowly but assuredly changed ... for the better. For some reason at some time God proved Himself and showed His intentions towards us when we came to personally know and then experience the life-altering change when one truly accepts the Lord Jesus Christ as Savoir and Lord. Lots of folks simply do not understand us. They tend to believe, and often times pity those of us who claim to be Christians, that we must have been the recipients of childhood brainwashing, or better yet, adulthood delusions. We have that "crutch" in our lives and that's Ok with them.

I don't know about you, but I can say that the Love of God for us and in us has become the solid foundation for life and in life, especially when times are in flux, when the world is experiencing the malady of the unknown, and when darkness fills the lives of so many who find themselves living in the shadowlands of uncertainty. With that said, I want to assure you of 3 absolute truths; 3 facts you can confidently know and take to heart. Together, these are the key to staying content in contentious circumstances.

Fact #1

God loves you. He always has and always will. God loves you not because you are super special or just so dog gone good, well how could he not? No God loves you simply because you are you. He loves you warts and all. He loves you through all of your failures and successes. He loves you and loved you before you were ever born. And to be quite frank, real life doesn't really begin until a person comes to the realization that there really is a God, and more that this God is personally interested in them. Let me repeat; God loves you and always will. Why? Simply because you are you and He is well, He or Him. You can count on it!

Fact #2

I love you. Now I know may seem trite. But it is not. And here's the reason why: I love you, not because you are necessarily you, not because you have been there all my life and I know you and have come to truly love you, not because you are necessarily always loveable ... but, I can say that I love you because you are undoubtedly — His. And to love Christ is to love the things and the ways and the people whom He loves. Believe me, to love God's people is not a chore. (It may be a challenge at times!). I am sure that you as well have considered that being loved by God, and

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loving and being loved by others, is the essence of what Christianity is all about. And if there is at least one good lesson that our quarantine time hopefully has revealed to us to the state of Christlikeness that many of us have struggled with in our lives. Consider the world in which we live. Especially when it comes to the political realm. Lots of People have stopped sharing opinions concerning policy. Social media can be so discouraging and disappointing. So much so I myself have had to read, and reread: "Whoever claims to love God yet hates a brother or sister is a liar. For whoever does not love their brother and sister, whom they have seen, cannot love God, whom they have not seen." (1 John 4:20 (NIV)

Here's an interesting little tidbit. Have you considered the words to the song, *They Will Know We Are Christians by Our Love*? They are pretty simple, yet they speak great truths that came out of a very divisive time.

Here's the history of the song.
"They'll Know We Are Christians" (also known as "They'll Know We Are
Christians By Our Love" or "We Are One in the Spirit") is a Christian hymn, written in the 1960s by then Catholic priest, the late Fr. Peter Scholtes. It is inspired by John 13:35.

The title of the hymn *They'll Know We* Are Christians by Our Love originates in a phrase that non-believers used to describe Christians believers of the early Church: "Behold, how they love one another."

Let me repeat: I love you, not because you have been there all my life and I know you and have come to truly love you, not because you are necessarily always loveable . . . but, I can say that I love you because you are undoubtedly—His. And you are! But keep in mind—you are. And because we are we have to be ever conscious of love for our Christian brothers and sisters---plus, and this is a big plus, it's our "witness" for Christ that remains the most important aspect of our collective Christianity in any situation, in any given era, during any particular period. Part of staying content in contentious circumstances is the ability push one's personal preferences aside, if we deem that the cause of Christ could be hurt.

And finally . . .

Fact #3

This too, came to pass . . . Look, God loves you. I love you. Our lives are typified by the fact that we are people who love each other. Hard times, such as the ones that we are experiencing now... come and go, and each one does eventually and inevitably wane. When all this present mess has passed, hopefully we learned something from going through this experience together.

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I know one thing I've learned; it is the reminder, the ever present and holy reminder that there is a surety in our lives. The surety is: Fact #1; and when we combine it with Fact #2; and accept the reality of Fact #3; together, these are not only a great foundation for our lives but also are the key to staying **con-tent** in **con-tentious** circumstances.

From the Board of Trustees

Instead of our quarterly financial report for the church congregation, we thought we would make monthly reports during this COVID-19 situation. This will be an overview of the financial position of the church, and we question how giving to the church may be affected by our not having normal Sunday worship services.

We are fortunate to have cash reserves as we enter this virus crisis. At the end of March, we had a little over \$93,000 in our Capital Reserve funds. However, our checking account balance has been reducing as we continue to pay our church bills. By the end of March, we only had about \$2250 of cash not obligated by our Accounts Payable. There is no immediate crisis because we are fortunate we have the cash reserves for times just like this, and we may have to transfer some reserve funds shortly. The windows project will cost almost \$28,000, and we have received about \$11,470 in gifts so far, and had expected the project to be paid for by these extra donations. We are considerably short in the donations we had wanted.

Our regular giving to the church has been great through March, about \$40,500, and our budget was \$39,000. Also in our financial statement, we have several categories of expenses. We have: 1. Staff Ministry (paid staff), 2. Staff Support (Payroll tax, Retirement expenses, and misc.), 3. Programs and Ministry Support (Expenses for various committees and teams), and 4. Church Operations (expenses that support our church programs, to include repairs, office expenses, utilities, etc.). At the end of the first three months, everything was very close to budget, except Church Operations, which was roughly \$8000 over budget. This was mainly because of new equipment of about \$4500, snow removal of about \$1000, and utilities of about \$2000. Our fellowship hall is used considerably by our church and the community, and we just completed installing electric door openers to assist our disabled and needy friends and family. This door project cost almost \$3200, and is a valuable improvement for church access. Our security issues have also been seriously addressed, and we have installed more security cameras in the church. The camera views are recorded, and can be monitored in the office, which helps protect our staff during the week.

Overall, we have a loss of about \$11,000 this year through March, when we had budgeted a loss of \$3700. This is something the trustees monitor closely, and we need to remind the church family how important your gifts and tithes are, to support our regular church activities and the mission of serving our community.

As we continue with the COVID-19 uncertainty, it should go without saying to keep faithful in your giving, not only to our church, but to others in need. We don't know how church gifts and offerings may be reduced because of not having the traditional worship services in our church sanctuary. We have options for continued church support, to include online giving, and of course the good old US post office delivery. Blessings to everyone, and stay safe. Support your friends and neighbors with your thoughts and prayers, and maybe a friendly phone call. Many of us are feeling lonely right now, and your phone call could be the highlight of someone's day.

The Rev. Robert Tarleton was assigned to Hot Springs in October, 1920. One th important thing he instilled in the hearts of the members was the consideration and thoughtfulness of each member to respect the beliefs of others and want each denomination to have equal representation in all matters and on all committees—no matter which denomination was the largest or the smallest.

A constitution containing 8 short aritcles, as prepared by a special committee of ten, was adopted and published in the Sunday bulletin on December 5, 1920, and thereafter this was considered the "official date" of the organization of The United Churches. The first article read: "The name of this organization shall be The United Churches of Hot Springs, South Dakota." The second article read: "The purpose of this united effort is to bring members of several churches into closer cooperative organization; to attempt to answer the prayer of the Master when He prayed 'That they

Update on the Windows Project



HYMN HISTORY HOW GREAT THOU ART

English Words by Stuart K. Hine (1899 – 1989 Every day I will praise You and extol Your name for ever and ever. Great is the Lord and most worthy of praise; His greatness no one can fathom.

(Psalm 145:2, 3)

Today's inspiring hymn of praise and adoration reminds us of God's unlimited power and love in creation and redemption. Although written in the past century, the hymn has become familiar to congregations just since the close of World War II. It especially become an international favorite after the Billy Graham Evangelistic Team used it in their crusades during the late 1940's and early 1950's.

The original text was written by a Swedish pastor, Carl Boberg, in 1996. While visiting a beautiful country estate, Boberg was caught in a sudden thunderstorm. The awesome and violent lightning and thunder quickly ended, leaving clear brilliant sunshine and the calm, sweet singing of the birds in the trees. Falling on his knees in awe and adoration of Almighty God, the pastor wrote nine stanzas of praise. Swedish congregations began to sing his lines to one of their old, folk tunes. The text was later translated into German and Russian and ultimately into English by the Rev. S. K. Hine and his wife, English missionaries to the people of the Ukraine. When war broke out in 1939, it was necessary for the Hines to return to Britain, where Mr. Hines added the fourth stanza to this hymn.

These four stanzas by Stuart Hine have since ministered and inspired God's people worldwide:

O Lord my God, when I in awesome wonder consider all the worlds Thy hands have made, I see the stars, I hear the rolling thunder,

Thy pow'r throughout the universe displayed!
When thru the woods and forest glades I
wander and hear the birds sing sweetly in the trees,
when I look down from loft mountain grandeur and hear
the brook and feel the gentle breeze.

And when I think that God, His Son not sparing, sent Him to die, I scarce can take it in – That on the cross, my burden gladly bearing,

He bled and died to take away my sin!
When Christ shall come with shout of acclamation and take me home, what joy shall fill my heart! Then I shall bow in humble adoration and there proclaim, my God, how great Thou art!

Chorus:

Then sings my soul, my Savior God, to Thee;
how great Thou art, how great Thor art!
Then sings my soul, my Savior God, to Thee;
how great Thou art, how great Thou art!

Bible References: Deuteronomy 3:24; Psalm 48:1; Isaiah

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Creeds and Confession Corner The Westminster Confession of Faith



In 1643, the English House of Commons adopted an ordinance calling for the "settling of the government and liturgy of the Church of England (in a manner) most agreeable to God's Holy Word and most apt to procure the peace of the church at home and nearer abroad." After the ordinance passed the House of

Lords, an assembly to accomplish this work convened in Westminster Abbey. The Parliament nominated one hundred fifty-one persons to the assembly. Thirty were members of Parliament; the others were "learned, godly, and judicious divines." Five Scottish clergymen were in attendance and had the right of discussion but not vote. Churches in Holland, Belgium, France, Switzerland, and the American colonies were invited to send delegates, though none came. The assembly held 1,163 sessions, finally concluding in 1649.

The Westminster Assembly conducted its work in a crisis atmosphere. Internal conflicts had nearly torn apart both England and the English church. Political and religious problems were inseparable. Who should rule the church? Who should rule the state? What power should the king have? What power Parliament, local councils, and assemblies? The Anglican party stood for royal rule in England with the sovereign also head of the church's government. The Presbyterian party sought to vest authority in elected representatives of the people, both in Parliament and in church presbyteries.

In 1647, the Scottish General Assembly adopted the Westminster Standards for use in the kirk, replacing the Scots Confession of 1560 and the Heidelberg Catechism. The standards came to New England with the Puritans (Independents) and to the Middle Atlantic states with the Scotch-Irish Presbyterians. In 1729, the standards were adopted as the confessional position of the newly organized Presbyterian synod in the colonies and have played a formative role in American Presbyterianism ever since. The Westminster Standards represent the fruits of a Protestant scholasticism that refined and systematized the teachings of the Reformation.
