OKTOBERFEST RAFFLE KICKS OFF WITH TWO GREAT PRIZES!**

The Oktoberfest Raffle, sponsored by Trinity Lutheran Church, kicked off Sunday, June 12, by displaying the two prizes, and selling raffle tickets. All profits from raffle ticket sales go toward the purchase of a walk-in cooler for the Birchwood Food Pantry.

Members of Trinity Lutheran are working together with Birchwood Food Pantry members to make this fund raiser a roaring success. A walk-in freezer is already in place at the Food Pantry, and both the freezer and the future walk-in cooler will allow larger purchases to be made.



The Grand Prize for the raffle is a queen-sized quilt called "Northwoods Summer" which reflects summer at the cabin in Northern Wisconsin. Eagles, bear, loons, and fish are cleverly stitched into the design. Small hand-appliqued quilts, cabins, and boats surround the old fashioned log cabin blocks. The quilt was designed, pieced, and hand appliquéd by Ginger

LaMotte, a member of Trinity Lutheran Church. The long-arm quilting with its clever designs was done by Laura Wertwijn, of Owatonna, Minnesota. The finished quilt has a value of \$700.

The second raffle prize is an original water color entitled "Bayfield Harbor" and is painted by well-known local artist, Paul Oman, of Amery, Wisconsin. Paul was a pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church, Birchwood, for eight years, and left five years ago to start his own inspirational global business, *Drawn to the Word*. This beautiful painting depicting the harbor view in Bayfield, Wisconsin, is valued at \$600.

The quilt and the watercolor painting is on display at the Dairy State Bank in Birchwood through October 6. Tickets will be sold at that bank, as well as these Birchwood businesses: Gary's Grocery, Jason's Market, Tagalong Golf Resort, and Trinity Lutheran Church. Dairy State Bank in Rice Lake will also sell tickets during July and August. Various members of Trinity and the Food Pantry will have tickets for sale, and tickets will be sold at various local summer and fall events. Tickets are priced at 3 for \$5, with all proceeds going to the Birchwood Food Pantry.

The drawing for the raffle prizes will take place Saturday, 7 pm, on October 8, at the community Oktoberfest meal to be held at the Birchwood School Commons. Everyone is invited to attend. There will also be numerous items to bid on in a silent auction. More information on that event will be announced closer to October 8.

## PASTOR JON'S COLUMN — Who do You want to be like when You grow up?

<sup>1</sup>When Jesus had finished saying all this to the people who were listening, he entered Capernaum. <sup>2</sup>There a centurion's servant, whom his master valued highly, was sick and about to die. <sup>3</sup>The centurion heard of Jesus and sent some elders of the Jews to him, asking him to come and heal his servant. <sup>4</sup>When they came to Jesus, they pleaded earnestly with him, "This man deserves to have you do this, <sup>5</sup>because he loves our nation and has built our synagogue." <sup>6</sup>So Jesus went with them. He was not far from the house when the centurion sent friends to say to him: "Lord, don't trouble yourself, for I do not deserve to have you come under my roof. <sup>7</sup>That is why I did not even consider myself worthy to come to you. But say the word, and my servant will be healed. <sup>8</sup>For I myself am a man under authority, with soldiers under me. I tell this one, 'Go,' and he goes; and that one, 'Come,' and he comes. I say to my servant, 'Do this,' and he does it." <sup>9</sup>When Jesus heard this, he was amazed at him, and turning to the crowd following him, he said, "I tell you, I have not found such great faith even in Israel." <sup>10</sup>Then the men who had been sent returned to the house and found the servant well." Luke 7:1-10

Jesus, once marveled at the faith he found in a man. And it's the only instance that the gospels record such a response from Jesus (Matthew 8:5-13; Luke 7:1-10). Who was this man? A rabbi? No. A disciple? Nope. A Roman soldier.

Jesus had walked down from the hills of a mountain outside of Capernaum. He had just delivered what would become the most famous sermon in history (The Sermon on the Mount). When he entered the town, he was met by a small delegation of Jewish elders. They had an urgent request. There was this Roman centurion whose servant was so sick that he was expected to die shortly. The centurion had asked these elders to go to Jesus on his behalf to see if Jesus might be willing to heal his servant. Now, this was very unusual. Jewish leaders were not in the habit of being fond of Roman soldiers. Perhaps sensing the obvious oddness of the request, one of the elders quickly adds, "He is worthy to have you do this for him, for he loves our nation, and he is the one who built us our synagogue." This was also unusual. Roman soldiers were not in the habit of being fond of Jews.

Why Jesus went I am not sure. Maybe Jesus "saw" God's will in this and so he set off with them to the centurion's home. He had also just preached a couple hours earlier on

the importance of loving one's enemies. Perhaps this was to provide an example of that lesson. As they neared the house another group of friends intercepted them. There was a brief huddle with the elders. There were soft voices speaking. I am imagining that the elders seemed confused and concerned. Maybe some thought the servant must have died.

Then a representative of the group stepped over to Jesus and said respectfully, "Teacher, I have a message for you from my Roman friend. He says, '*Lord, do not trouble yourself, for I am not worthy to have you come under my roof. Therefore I did not presume to come to you. But say the word, and let my servant be healed. For I too am a man set under authority, with soldiers under me: and I say to one, "Go" and he goes; and to another, "Come," and he comes; and to my servant, "Do this," and he does it.*'"

What happened next? What did it look like on that day? I imagine that Jesus' expression turned thoughtful. Perhaps He thinks about the words, "I am not worthy to have you

come under my roof" and "I too am a man under authority with soldiers under me." I picture Him nodding his head slightly and I wonder if there was just a hint of a chuckle from Jesus as He thinks, "*This man was a Roman soldier, a representative of Israel's enemy. And yet he understood what even these Jewish elders didn't yet grasp.*" It was a marvel. He looked back at the friend and then to the elders. Then he turned and scanned his eyes over his disciples and the small crowd of people who had followed him down the mountain.

Then he said, loud enough for everyone to hear, "*I tell you, not even in Israel have I found such faith.*"

Both Luke (Luke 7:9) and Matthew (Matthew 8:10) use the Greek word *thaumazo* (thou-mad'-zo) which we translate "marveled" or "amazed" to describe Jesus' response to the centurion's faith. The only time this word is used to describe Jesus' response to others' faith is in Mark 6:6, when he marvels at the *lack of faith* in the people of Nazareth, where he grew up.

The centurion was one of the most unlikely persons to amaze Jesus. He was a Gentile. Certainly he had a pagan upbringing. He was a Roman, stationed in Palestine to subject the Jews to the Emperor's rule. He was a man of war. He achieved the rank of centurion by distinguishing himself above others in the brutal Roman art of war. Not exactly the résumé you'd expect for becoming one of the Bible's great heroes of faith.

So what in the world had happened to this man? We don't know. But there he is in Capernaum; a miracle of God's marvelous grace. And he's a "first-fruit" and a foreshadowing of what Jesus had come to bring about. He was a living illustration spoken of in Matthew – *that "many [would] come from the east and west*



*and recline at table with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 8:11).*

This centurion is also a reminder to us that "man looks on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart" (1 Samuel 16:7). I think we will be surprised someday when Jesus doles out rewards. Most of the great ones among us will probably have lived in obscurity. Jesus is not as impressed with titles, degrees, and achievements as we are. He is impressed with those who really do humbly believe him.

Billy Graham once said, "God will not reward fruitfulness, he will reward faithfulness." The centurion was faith-full. I want to be like him when I grow up.

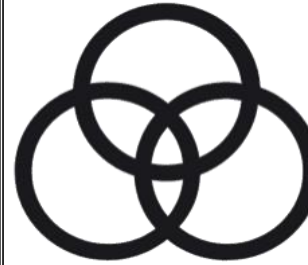
